DC SHORTS 2012 BY THE NUMBERS....

\$320,000+ was spent by festival organizers, the audience and filmmakers in the Penn Quarter neighborhood over the course of **3** days of competition and **8** days of general screenings for a total of **11** days of film and events.

140 films were screened from **27** countries, which were selected from more than **1,100** entries. **132** filmmakers attended the event from **13** countries and **14** states.

8,266 tickets were sold -- an increase of *22% over 2011*. In addition, **63** VIP passes and **370** social coupon deals were purchased for the **18** competition screenings and **67** general screenings, of which **11** were sold out.

2,485 people attended "Best of DC Shorts" screenings.

Filmmakers stayed in **49** hotel rooms and **13** private homes during the competition weekend, resulting in over **\$37,253** in hotel and transportation charges.

The City View Rooftop Party at Carroll Square was attended by more than **320** guests, who consumed **550** mini burgers, crabcakes and pizza rolls, and ate **6** cheese platters .

510 film lovers purchased tickets the Grand Bash at the US Navy Memorial Heritage Center, consuming **2,100** hors d'oeuvres, **4** kegs of beer, **67** bottles of wine and **24** bottles of vodka and **18** bottles of bourbon.

137 "Feed-a-Filmmaker" passes were distributed to visiting filmmakers, who ate 198 meals at our sponsors' restaurants, leaving \$356 worth of tips, and consuming an additional \$4,222 worth of food and beverages.

3,920 audience members also purchased meals in Penn Quarter, eating **\$70,447** worth of food and beverages and spending **\$10,567** in gratuities.

5,850 attendees arrived by Metro, with an average of **\$10,775** of fares purchased. Another **177** people parked their cars — many in area garages, totaling **\$770** in parking charges. There was a **14%** decrease in the use of cars to arrive to the festival — making for a greener audience!

10,000 postcards and **65,000** catalogs — all with sponsors' logos — were distributed at more than **87** restaurants and **70** shops in the neighborhood, and handed out to **3,200** people at various outdoor film screenings and the H Street Festival. **25,000** catalogs were distributed in copies of *OnTap Magazine*, and another **8,000** were distributed by the *Washington Examiner*.

47,811 people visited our web site, **dcshorts.com**, during the festival week, viewing **125,347** pages, including **914** hits to the listing of sponsors, resulting in **477** clicks through to their web sites.

Our media machine was able to generate an additional **125** newspaper, web and blog articles, **37** community and newspaper listings, **3** segments on radio and TV. Every film was reviewed in **4** blogs and papers. Our total media coverage reached a total audience of more than **3,750,000** unique individuals.

identities secret in order to "avoid retaliation on the World Wide Web from those whose work" they "fail' to recognize."

This sort of blind, deliberately de-politicized awards ceremony is rare—even unique—in the entertainment industry, and the response from moviemakers has been extremely supportive. As MMA nominee and Thriller! Chiller! International Film Festival Director A.E. Griffith puts it, "MMA is the Indie Spirit Awards of true indie filmmakers. The Oscars for actual ass kickers!"

In its fourth year, Maverick Movie Awards gave out 42 awards in 21 categories in 2012, including top honors to the documentary The Imposter (2012)—which was a Sundance Grand Jury Prize nominee last year, if you're wondering about MMA's pedigree. But they also honored a number of smaller-profile films. As the MMA codirector (who shall remain nameless, in accordance with his wishes) told MovieMaker recently, "By keeping the judging blind, we're able to nominate an internationally reknowned film like The Imposter alongside a much more obscure Japanese film like The Undertaker-which might not have gotten any attention in America without us."

MMA is gearing up for its fifth annual awards, and if you're wondering if you should submit, the answer is: Yes! MMA celebrates big-budget pictures, low-budget indies, global issue documentaries, microcinema, music videos, webisodes, and everything in between. Each movie is judged as a whole, but also on the quality of its parts. So, in addition to standard award categories like Best Picture and Best Director, the MMA prides itself on saluting disciplines oft overlooked by festivals—including stunts, special effects makeup, and original music.

Submissions to the 5th Annual Maverick Movie Awards opened January 1st.

(And here's another tip: don't miss the select screenings paired with delicious food and beverages from local awardwinning chefs and mixologists.)

On top of everything, DC Shorts screened "Wednesday's Child" at the technically flawless downtown Landmark Theatre, alongside some of the most amazing filmmakers in the world—from Australia to Venezuela. So not only did our film have the opportunity to screen with shorts starring Gérard Depardieu and Dame Judi Dench, but we could also meet, mingle and plan future collaborations with the visiting international filmmakers.

Even then the festival was large, but now NBFF screens over 400 films on 14 screens during their eight-day run. In 2009, *Spooner* screened at their flagship venue, the Historic Regency Lido Theatre, a beautiful, 600-seat movie palace built in the 1930s.
